

Dear MEZCOPH Community,

Welcome to the start of another vibrant academic year! I hope your summer break was refreshing and offered a chance to recharge. This year marks the **25th anniversary** of our college, and as we come together once again on campus, it's a pleasure to greet our returning students, staff, and faculty—and to extend a warm welcome to all the new members of our community joining us this fall.

This year, we are proud to welcome 1028 new and returning students to the Mel and Enid Zuckerman College of Public Health. Our programs continue to span multiple University of Arizona campuses and modalities, and we are pleased to greet:

- 710 students on the Main Campus in Tucson
- 250 students enrolled in Arizona Online
- 45 students at the Phoenix Campus
- 23 students on the Arizona International Campus.

Among our undergraduate population, we welcome 76 new students, 71 of whom are enrolled in the BS in Public Health program and 5 in the BA in Wellness and Public Health Practice degree. On the graduate side, we welcome 109 new students, including 90 MPH students and 19 pursuing MS and doctoral degrees. Notably, our MD/MPH program in Clinical Leadership has grown by 84.6% compared to last year, reflecting our continued commitment to expanding public health leadership across Arizona.

The Global Health Institute's Dual Degree Program, offered in collaboration with Universidad del Valle de México (UVM), continues to thrive, now enrolling a total of 68 students across two cohorts. This includes 61 students in the BSPH/Medicine track and 7 new students in the BSPH/Biotechnology track. Building on the success of this initiative, MEZCOPH is exploring additional dual degree pathways in dentistry and nutrition with UVM, as well as a promising new partnership with Universidad Peruana de Ciencias Aplicadas (UPC) in Peru. These developments mark exciting progress in global health education, positioning MEZCOPH to train the next generation of public health professionals on an international scale.

I'm also excited to share that our new **Direct Admissions** pathway to the MPH has officially launched. This streamlined process is available to qualified graduates from Arizona's three state universities (UA, ASU, and NAU), making the application faster and simpler. We

encourage our undergraduate students who are preparing to graduate and considering an MPH to take advantage of this opportunity!

Welcoming New Faculty and Staff

I am excited to share that the health professions degree programs from the former College of Health Sciences have officially joined our college as the new **School of Health Professions** (SHP). This important transition paves the way for meaningful collaboration with our new colleagues and creates exciting opportunities for innovation in education and research for our students. Please join me in extending a warm and heartfelt welcome to all the faculty, staff, and students in SHP. We're thrilled to have you with us and look forward to working together in the months ahead.

In addition, our new AI for Public Health Initiative is paving the way to train a new

This initiative includes the development of new courses, cutting-edge research projects, and our inaugural Public Health & AI Summer School, all focused on leveraging AI to drive innovation in public health. As AI becomes increasingly integrated into all aspects of health services, our college is well positioned to lead in this emerging field with a thoughtful, informed, and ethical approach.

Finally, I hope to see you all at our upcoming **MEZCOPH Mixer** on September 17th from 11:30am to 1:30pm in the Walkway of Wellness! Organized by the Learn, Inspire, Flourish, Thrive (LIFT) Committee, this event is a wonderful opportunity to come together as a college, enjoy food and refreshments, and celebrate another exciting year.
