- I have put great emphasis on research productivity and this was also reflected in the new hiring decisions I made.
- I strengthened the research office to foster and support faculty research in conjunction with the business office, Centers, and Departments
- I have established the Dean’s annual fund program as a College wide mechanism for funding for pilot research and research scholastic activities supporting faculty and students
- The College also strives to involve students in both the conduct of the projects as well as publications resulting from them.
- Our research productivity as been significantly increasing over the last 5 years.

Research themes & priorities:

- *The College’s research portfolio is* diverse, ranging from bench science to Community-based research. Funding is obtained from a wide variety of sources, including federal agencies such as NIH, CDC, HRSA, SAMHSA, to national and local foundations. Equally impressive are the wide-ranging collaborations within and among a variety of academic institutions, state and local health departments, and community agencies locally, nationally and internationally.
- Considerable effort is made to address issues of health equities with a focus on the underserved populations of the Southwest and globally.
- As part of the strategic planning process (2013-2020), I worked with the College leadership team and the faculty and identified several research themes that draw upon the current strengths that exist in the College and that provide opportunity for growth.
- These areas are (1) Wellness & lifestyle behaviors (nutrition/physical activity) and health promotion across the lifespan, (2) advancing health equity for diverse populations and vulnerable populations, (3) global health and One health, (4) exposure science & risk assessment (5) Health outcomes and health care services research, (6) rural health, and (6) health informatics, biostatistics and evaluation.

- In Spring 2022, The college will review the outcome of the previous strategic plan and engage in a new 5-year strategic plan for the College.

Community Engagement & Outreach: Ongoing

- I have put great emphasis on community engagement and outreach and this was also reflected in hiring an associate dean for community engagement and outreach
- The College bought and supports two mobile health units that provide outreach health education, screening and referrals to community health centers to support underserved and rural communities both in English and Spanish under the leadership of the Associate Dean of Community Engagement and Outreach
- In 2018, The College won the ASPPH award for 2nd place in community engagement among all accredited schools and programs.
- College implemented a number of children programs such as “Healthy 2B Me Camp” for Underserved Youth (H2BM), afterschool programs for girls & boys (Marana School district); Childhood obesity prevention (St Paul & Peter school) etc.
- Partnership with health organizations & Businesses: Active in fostering a partnership with Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS), County health departments, Blue Cross Blue Shield of AZ, El-Rio Community center, Arizona Complete Health, etc
- During the COVID-19 pandemic, public health faculty support was significant and they were all engaged at University, State, National and global levels

Inter-professional education & research: Ongoing

- In addition to grants and contracts funded directly through the College, I encouraged faculty work in conjunction with other academic and research units on campus.
- Established the Zuckerman Family Center for Prevention & Health Promotion as the leading unit for the new “Metabolic Diseases Initiatives” at University of Arizona south campus in collaboration with departments of Family & Community Medicine & diabetes center (College of Medicine) and Nutritional Sciences (College of Agriculture and Life Sciences).
- Our two Mobile Health units are operated by students from the UAZ Health Sciences Colleges (Public Health, Medicine, Nursing and Pharmacy)
- During COVID-19 pandemics, The College is providing training and support to the university, local communities and the state
- Established a number of dual degrees with different colleges across campus
- Work closely with the UA cancer center to support new hires in cancer prevention and population sciences

Communication & Marketing: 2019-Ongoing

- Strengthened communication & marketing by hiring a new experienced “Director of Communications and Digital Media” and adding multimedia and social media staff support. This resulted in ongoing updates of our website pages, regular internal updates, monthly e-newsletter, and an annual report (both hard and digital copies).

- Communicating faculty, staff, students and alumni's accomplishments regularly which is very much appreciated and valued by MEZCOPH members.
- The team has been instrumental in delivering our virtual and on campus events such as our 20th anniversary gala (virtual) and Homecoming 2021 (on site)

Alumni Relations & Engagement: 2021 - Ongoing

- Created a new position for alumni relations to strengthen the relationship with our alumni and actively engage them with the college.
- Homecoming event 2021 celebrating our alumnus of the year along with our 2021 young alumnus, global alumnus and honorary alumnus of the year

Development: Ongoing

- Overall, working with the UA foundation and development director, we have successfully raised gifts of over \$15 million, including an endowment for the Zuckerman Family Center for Prevention and Health Promotion (\$ 4 million), scholarship endowment (\$2.3 million); Dalen endowment for Public Health Policy (\$1.5 million), endowment for student internships in global Health (\$110,000), Scholarships fund (\$2 M over 10 years) and several named scholarships ranging from \$10,000 to \$200,000 each.
- In the last three years, I secured funding for different programs such as "childhood obesity (\$400,000) and health and wellness (\$500,000), One health (\$150,000).
- In addition, in 2021, the College established several scholarship endowments ranging from \$25,000 to \$150,000 each.
- College successfully completed the \$2 Million match for the Zuckerman challenge for student scholarships and programs for a total of \$4 millions
- Working on new initiatives for annual giving/membership.
- I have just hired a new coordinator for alumni affairs
